

- 2.6 QUALIFICATIONS OF VOTERS: The persons entitled to vote at any Parish meeting shall be:

WORSHIP: FLOWER GUILD

The Flower Guild of St. Luke's Episcopal Church has served the parish by providing flower arrangements and decorative support for regular Sunday morning worship, for the major festivals of the church year, for weddings and funerals, and for special parish events.

Flowers are present when dedications have been provided by parish members, both current and former, (especially those who often remember family and friends from afar). The Coronavirus Pandemic has interrupted the majority of flower work since March 2020; however, we did make special arrangements for Easter 2020 and 2021, and Christmas 2020. Until very recently, we have had the pleasure of preparing flowers for a few weeks now that services had resumed, but sadly, we are again suspended.

There are tri-fold flower dedication order forms on the back tables of the church. Flower Memorials and Thanksgivings can also be arranged by simply by emailing flowers@slechurch.org or by contacting Gordon Frey or Tim Mannion directly. We will be happy to work with you. The basic amount requested for any given Sunday's flowers is \$80, but if that amount is too high for you, you should consider partnering with friends for a combined memorial or thanksgiving. No gift to the Flower Guild is ever too small!

The special flower arrangements we have done for church festivals such as Christmas, Easter, Palm Sunday, and Pentecost do not happen without a host of helpers. Thank you to EVERYONE who has supported this ministry, particularly Sue Villarosa, Martha Thalheimer, and Susan Andersen who has recently started designing Sunday flowers with us!

WORSHIP: VIRTUAL VERGERS

The team of "Virtual Vergers" was a new ministry in 2020, brought about by necessity during this time of pandemic. In 2021, we continued to refine our online experience. From January through May, we remained online only, and then we shifted to a hybrid format. We expect to continue providing an online option for worship indefinitely, even if and when the church is open for in-person worship. During the services, the role of the virtual verger is to mute and unmute participants at appropriate times, provide responses where necessary, and to manage questions that arise during the service. A small team of seasoned virtual vergers has emerged: Rochelle Wilson, Martha Thalheimer, Denise Price, Amrita Frederick, and Molly Ann Williams have faithfully served in this role over the past year. OUTREACH: CARING COMMUNITY

The Caring Community offers practical assistance and outreach to homebound members of the congregation and others experiencing significant physical stressors. In the pre-COVID world (and gradually beginning anew now) that has meant visits at homes and healthcare facilities, advocacy for healthcare-related support service, occasional accompaniment of parishioners to a recreational outing, and, above all, rides to church and medical appointments. Traditionally, the Caring Community has also reached out by phone, handwritten notes, flowers left at the door, and other forms of contact for those who are socially isolated or faced with a sudden loss.

Food and Rides - 2020

A. Food Delivery

Without question, the COVID pandemic affected the scope of services the Caring Community was able to provide in 2020. In recent years the Caring Community had developed (and at present has resumed) a system of providing homecooked meals for our homebound fellow congregants, through a rotation among volunteer members. A rotation typically originates with guidance from clergy, bringing to our attention that an individual or family was confronting a stressful situation, and would welcome food and visits. As a particular need arises, the CC contacts a range of parishioners beyond the core Caring Community loyalists, to solicit interest in cooking and delivering casseroles, soups, salads or other culinary creations for the receiving person or family, on a rotating basis, for a defined period of time. This system has many advantages: it allows parishioners unable to engage in frequent, repetitive CC activities with an opportunity to participate on a one-off basis, while providing recipients with a sustained pattern of care and concern – not to mention a variety of delicious foods.

In 2020, the Pandemic led us to suspend temporarily the "round robin" food prep/delivery/visit part of our ministry, and we converted our efforts to delivering food "treats" to a recipient's doorstep. As the year progressed, we learned of the types of treats some of those served particularly enjoyed (avocados representing a surprising, but admirable treat of choice). Caring Community volunteers regularly delivered these "treats" during the year, with at least one such delivery taking place each week from May 1, 2020 through year end 2020.

B. Transportation

During the six years of its existence, the Caring Community has consistently found that a segment of our community has a significant need for help with transportation. The need might center on access to church services, to special events at church, or to medical appointments. From a quantitative, though not necessarily qualitative, standpoint, help with transportation has stood out in past years as the predominant service offered by the Caring Community.

Naturally the pandemic made huge inroads on the transportation piece of the Caring Community's work in 2020. Rides to church were out the window, and rides to doctors necessarily occurred on a very limited basis. Interface with outside organizations was also interrupted; for example, the Montclair Senior Bus Roundtable, on which the Caring Community's leader was a participant, came to a halt, as, unfortunately did the Montclair Senior Bus service. While COVID necessarily created a hiatus in the Caring Community's normal transportation help for parishioners, we took the opportunity to reflect on the manner in which we were requesting participation from the congregation, and on the potential pool of persons who might help.

In this process, we also became better aware of those who have been giving rides to others without prompting by, or connection with, a formal ministry like the Caring Community. Those folks – you know who you are – deserve our gratitude.

Connection in the Wake of COVID-19

In this period of necessary social distancing the Caring Community sought to find new ways to fulfill our mission. Adapting to these new conditions in 2020, we focused on initiatives for social connection, notably:

C. "Phone Buddy System"

The Caring Community, again with guidance from our clergy, continued to identify folks who were isolated in congregate living or care facilities, or who were unable to participate remotely in church services, or who, for other reasons, have had diminished engagement with available church resources during the pandemic. Volunteers serve as regular "one on one" phone buddies, matched with specific individuals who are, or may be, in need of connection. Phone contacts can consist simply of a brief, friendly "check-in", to ask how the person is doing, ranging to more extended talks – wherever the conversation leads.

D. Congregation Connection

In alliance with Vestry rep Denise Price, powered by our own computer genius, Stevie Tryson, and aided with publicity by a terrific communicator, Dan Salvito, the Caring Community has supported an exciting social interchange called "Congregation Connection." Through Congregation Connection, all are welcome to join a one-hour Zoom conversation, Thursday evenings at 7:00 p.m. Conversations have touched on topics ranging from "what I did last week" to "what the U.S. Supreme Court did last week". Through these weekly, free-form conversations, participants have said that they look forward to these times together, in the midst of the week's pressures and challenges, as a little oasis.

The Ministry of Toni's Kitchen at St. Luke's

Toni's Kitchen is where we extend ourselves as a Cathedral in the Community, by responding to God's call to feed the hungry, clothe those in need, and welcome the stranger. In doing so, we express our faith to the larger community. At St. Luke's we embrace this calling as our joyful work.

Our food ministry envisions a community where everyone has reliable access to healthy food. Toni's provides food to our neighbors in need in ways that improve health and independence. Our door is open and all are welcome.

As we engage in this work, we recognize food as an expression of respect, an opportunity to know the stranger and to nurture our mutual need to be in community with each other. Toni's Kitchen is a tangible manifestation of our love – for God in our midst, for each other, for those in our community who struggle.

Reflecting on Our Year

As we all are aware, 2020 was a challenging year for everyone. We were tested in ways we never imagined. At Toni's Kitchen, we were blessed to see the resilience of our community in the face of these challenges.

In March 2020, when the pandemic closed all businesses and schools, Toni's faced an unknown moment. All the places our neighbors without housing went for basic comfort – feeding programs, the libraries, coffee shops – were closed. At Toni's, we could not safely invite our guests indoors. The 50+ community partners we worked with to get food out to families and children were also closed. In addition, our older adults knew they were especially at risk and needed food support immediately. At Toni's, we recognized there would be significant new food need in our community, but our regular distribution network was closed. Connecting with this need would be an enormous challenge.

In March 2020, Toni's Kitchen immediately prioritized three initiatives:

- Soup Kitchen meals were moved to meals to go for our guests without housing.
- We partnered with schools in three towns to ensure that as **families** picked up their school meals (the only school programs still operational), they would also be able to pick up groceries for the week. We also set up grocery distributions onsite to support families.
- We partnered with the Health Dept, the Kiwanis and a multitude of volunteers to implement home delivery of meals and groceries to over 550 **seniors** in two communities.

Here are some highlights from the year that followed:

Food Outreach Programs

Toni's Kitchen provided over **1,030,000 meals** in our community in 2020. All of our programs needed to be fundamentally redesigned in order to support this need:

- An onsite **food pantry** was set up to support families in need. We were especially heartened to see the warm embrace this pantry receives from recent immigrant families a particularly hard-to-reach population.
- **To-Go Meals** were developed for our soup kitchen guests. This population was especially hard hit during Covid-19. All the places our neighbors without housing go for restrooms, to be out of the weather, and to socialize were closed the libraries, coffee shops, feeding programs. These to-go meals were so critical but we knew they were not nearly enough.

- **Street-level outreach** replaced some of the work we did through partner programs who had closed. This work continues.
- In February 2021, we launched Toni's Café, a **food truck** to connect with hard-to-reach community members. This truck was planned for in our 2017 Strategic Plan and the current iteration is a test of the model. We are delighted to see the warm reception it has received in the community.
- 2021 also saw the launch of **TK Delivers**, a home delivery program serving both seniors and families. This program currently served 325 seniors weekly and 100 families.
- **Food Partner Support** continued during Covid, working with the Montclair Inn and some partner pantries.

Facilities

- An enormous hug to all the St. Luke's community for inviting Toni's Kitchen to use significant additional space. We set up the conference room as a Senior Grocery room to support home deliveries. The Davis Room was similarly set up to support family bags.
- Rev. Mennell was able to quickly secure two refrigeration units to support the significant increase in space needed for these items. Phew!
- Toni's also received a very generous donation of a new walk-in fridge and a new glass door fridge.

Food Supply

- Toni's experienced significant challenges with food supply and with the ability to purchase particular items. We were able to connect with certain food distributors who were experiencing their own disruptions in their customer distribution network. This was tremendously helpful as we were able to use their food before it spoiled. During 2020, there were many food and supply items we were forced to purchase in bulk at significant price increases.
- The Community Foodbank administered an emergency USDA grant from the federal government. This grant brought emergency food boxes of mixed food items to Toni's Kitchen during critical months in 2020. Boxes contained protein, produce and dairy items. This grant was an ENORMOUS benefit in the summer and fall of 2020. The CFBNJ was a terrific partner every step of the way in 2020.
- In order to address our food supply issues, Toni's initiated town-wide food drives on a monthly basis during the last year. These have brought in 6,000-9,000 pounds of food during each drive. Many thanks to Susan Andersen for her leadership role in this. Cathie Mazza, Denise Price, Stuart Christie big thanks for being so supportive!

Financial Donations

- Our community stepped in right away to support our financial needs during the pandemic. We are deeply grateful to the St. Luke's members and the community more broadly for thinking of our guests during this particularly challenging time.
- We are especially grateful to the Township of Montclair and local funders, including Partners for Health Foundation, The Montclair Foundation, The Schumann Fund for NJ, and The Montclair Fund for Women for working together to put together an immediate relief package for Toni's as soon as the shutdown happened. This quick action let us know that we could make some challenging purchasing decisions and the community would stand with us.
- Bob and Rhonda Silver and the Silver Family Foundation (The Bravitas Group) made an amazing offer to match any donations received by Toni's over a five-day period. Toni's Kitchen raised \$111,291.50 and the Silvers matched this donation dollar for dollar for a total raised of \$222,583 woo-hoo! Amazing generosity from the Silvers and our community!
- An anonymous donor stepped in with substantial regular donations, checking in regularly to see how we were doing. So very grateful.

- A huge thank you to the O'Leary family for donating a Ford Transit truck to us. This truck allows us to pick up large donations and to delivery groceries to partner programs. It is busy seven days a week!
- Toni's Kitchen was able to secure a NJ State grant in the amount of \$663,750 in March 2021. This grant allows us to purchase meals through local restaurants. Big thank you to Nesta Stephens for making this happen!
- Scott Harvin, a former member of St. Luke's and a volunteer at Toni's Kitchen, blessed us with a donation from his sister Betsey's estate. We are tremendously grateful to Scott and to Jo Ann Short for her role in these arrangements.
- Many of our St. Luke's friends made financial donations to Toni's Kitchen to support our work during these critical times. We will not mention each of you here but we are deeply grateful to each of you. We felt your presence with us every day.

Volunteers

- One of our biggest worries in 2020 was our volunteer base. Would we have the staffing, especially during those early months, to feed our community? We needn't have worried. Volunteers helped us with donation pickups, with packing food, cooking, etc. They did this even as the very basics of the virus and how it was transmitted were still unknown. We are just speechless!
- Our volunteers in the kitchen separated into small cooking pods and we were able to go from seven
 cooking shifts a week to 17 in order to support the need for cooked meals, especially for homebound
 seniors.

Toni's Closet

- Toni's Closet was scheduled to open in Bloomfield the same week everything was shut down. It was a huge disappointment to be unable to open. However, an amazing team was able to open the Shop in July 2020. We may be the only retail store to actually open during the pandemic!! Big thanks to Carol Costello, Jane O'Leary, Ellen Blankfein, Jess Michaud, and Bev D'Andrea for being retail superheroes! And none of this would have happened without Stacey Cooper, her husband Aaron, Jessica Troupe, Rich Brown, Michael Mernin, and Kerry Giles, who all went way above and beyond to make Toni's Closet a reality.
- Toni's Closet was able to use the Assembly Hall as its 'back office' during the pandemic. We are grateful to the St. Luke's community for making this available during the last year. It was key to maintaining social distancing as donations were sorted. Thank you!
- Toni's Closet just celebrated its one-year anniversary as an all-volunteer run operation.
- The building Toni's Closet occupies has been sold and Toni's Closet will close its doors in Bloomfield at the end of September 2021. We will miss it dearly but are excited for its next incarnation. See plans in "The Year Ahead."

Organizational Growth

- Toni's has needed to tend to its organization structure, staffing and management processes in order to support this new growth. We were able to welcome Sharilyn Pacheco to run our pantry program, Angie Brown to get our food truck on regular footing and Jennifer Pine to support us on the admin side. This brings our total staffing to three full-time and three part-time staff along with a few people we can draw on for occasional hourly work.
- Toni's Kitchen also redesigned some key internal processes to ensure smooth, robust operations.
- A big thank you to Keith Kawecki and Nesta Stephens for spending time thinking through our financial management procedures with us. We use these new processes every day!

The Year Ahead

The year ahead promises to be a busy one, with new initiatives and an extended outreach into our community. We will be focusing on further reinforcing our organization and improving our services. Here are some highlights:

2021 Goals:

These are the annual goals laid out in January for Toni's Kitchen:

- **Toni's Cafe Truck** Our goal was to test out our particular model of a food truck by retrofitting our large van and developing a test route. This has been tremendously successful. We will be purchasing a new truck in the Fall to fully support this new program.
- Choice Pantry Implement a Choice Pantry. When the pandemic hit, we quickly set up a new pantry. However, we would like to improve the pantry outreach both to serve our guests better and to use our food resources more effectively. We are currently testing out "Choice" options in our pantry and are seeing strong success in this. We also have some online work being developed to improve the interface with the program.
- **TK Delivers** Implement a robust home delivery program. In addition to homebound seniors, there are many families for whom trips to a food pantry are difficult. It may be that they are working irregular shift work, do not have transportation or childcare, or are recent immigrants and fear being identified. This program is hugely successful, but we are rolling out the family component slowly to allow us to build support for it as we go. This program works closely with our food truck program.
- Re-open Indoor Dining This is a challenge because our dining room is now a warehouse for our pantry program. There are also significant health considerations. We have a plan to reopen in the Assembly Hall two days a week beginning July 22. Guests will be given a to-go meal and be welcomed indoors to eat and be in air conditioning. There will not be full food service until the Undercroft Project is completed.
- Strategic Plan Toni's prior Strategic Plan (2017) was due for an update in 2020. However, this update was delayed due to the pandemic. In January 2021, a Strategic Planning Committee was formed and worked closely and quickly to develop a new plan. The plan was finalized and approved by the St. Luke's Vestry in June. Big thanks to Stuart Christie, Alison Curtin, Susan Andersen, Keith Kawecki, Nesta Stephens, Jo Ann Short for their many hours of work on this.

Additional Goals/Significant Initiatives have been added as the year has unfolded:

- Relocate Toni's Closet to St. Luke's Since the storefront that Toni's Closet uses in Bloomfield has been sold, Toni's Closet was asked to move operations to St. Luke's. We are delighted at the opportunity! The volunteers of Toni's Closet and the Second Time Around Shop have worked together to create a structure to open a brand-new initiative called "Toni's Closet: A Second Time Around Shop." This is a large initiative that involves closing down the Bloomfield location, reorganizing the St. Luke's location, and cleaning out both spaces. The new initiative is tentatively planned to open in October, 2021. Thank you to Stephanie Borsi, Sarah Stransky, Wendy Drake-Schneider, Cathie Mazza, Jason Andersen, Susan Andersen, Denise Price, Martha Thalheimer, and Melissa Goslin for your insights and support.
- Daytime Warming Center Toni's Kitchen and three community partners intervened during the winter months to provide a place where our homeless guests could come in out of the weather during the daytime since their regular warming spots were closed. This Warming Center was located at the Unitarian Universalist Church. Toni's administered the grant and did the planning for the initiative as well as providing food.
- Sustain and Serve Restaurant Grant This is the large restaurant grant Toni's received from the State (see notes above.). This grant will run through July 31, 2021. There is a possibility of a second round of this grant beginning in September 2021 and running through January 2022.

- **The Undercroft Project** As our space needs have grown, there has been planning to open up the space below the sanctuary for use by Toni's Kitchen. This will be a major initiative. Planning is underway to design its use and scope out the time and cost of the initiative.
- **Restart of Prior Programs** We look forward to restarting our Healthy Backpack Program, Kids in the Kitchen, The Service Continues, our Health and Wellness Programs, Exercise Program, and all the daily work that feel 'normal' at Toni's Kitchen!

St. Luke's Sanctuary front brick patio and perennial beds have been Gracefully Grounded this past year by a wonderful team of parish volunteers including: Nancy and Mike Alberga, Stuart Christie, Sarah Eggleston, Hal Garrity, Julia Ginocchio, Melissa Goslin, Ari Measday, Patt Sullivan-Perry, and Sarah Stransky.

We gladly gather with our own trowels, clippers, kneelers, brooms, vegetation bags and fun conversation for an hour and a half, 4-6 times a year to re-dress St. Luke's frontals facing Union and South Fullerton Ave. In early spring you'll find us weeding and cleaning around the donated May in Montclair 400 Tulips that are in various stages of beauty. We return to trim the spent tulip stems and again manage the unwanted weeds. Then in late spring, the beds are spruced with a deer resistant annual, periwinkle vinca, that offers 5 months of bloom color adjacent to the shrubs of sedum demanding their spots to shine each summer/fall. The year's cycle is completed in Nov by securing groups of tulip bulbs in 4" deep holes planting Hope for next Spring.

Due to the COVID pandemic, the work of the Capital Campaign Committee slowed to a crawl. No meetings were held, although work on projects and some planning of future projects continued with partnering St. Luke's entities, particularly Toni's Kitchen and the Music Committee.

Projects: St. Luke's capital campaign *Breaking Down Barriers* had completed the most complex major projects on the priority list: Bridge/Connector including new Sacristy/Flower Guild room, ADA-compliant Family Bathroom, new Lights & Sound System by the close of CY 2019. Through careful bidding, selection of contractors and close construction management supported by Sionas Architecture, we have continued to be able to bring the projects within their initial estimated costs, despite a number of previously unknown structural and electrical challenges associated with the bridge/connector project. In 2019, major Parish House roof, ventilation system, and attic repairs had been planned and successfully completed.

In 2020 and to date in 2021:

- St. Luke's completed work to fully clean and upgrade components of the Marshall & Ogletree Opus Two organ thanks to dedicated donations received by the Capital Campaign Fund a new motherboard will likely be needed in the future;
- Planning and municipal permitting was completed and all work completed on the new South Fullerton Street/Parking lot-level entrance to the thrift shop;
- An upgrade in electrical capacity was negotiation with PSEG and installed.
- Planning for a major renovation and re-purposing of the church undercroft and its access point was launched with Toni's Kitchen, which envisions using the space for expanded storage capacity;
- The St. Luke's application to the State of NJ for funds with which to reimburse St. Luke's for the completion of the Rectory underground oil tank's removal and soil remediation was approved by the NJDEP and discussion is continuing with the NJEDA over the amount and scheduling of reimbursement funding payment. Actual work on this project cannot begin until NJ EDA resolves those issues;
- Planning and cost estimation for additional accessibility improvements to the Parish House continued into 2021with new urgency.

There are also a number of other serious major maintenance and capital improvement projects – including masonry re-pointing of the Church, stained glass restoration and protection, Church south entry restoration, first floor Rectory reconfiguration, and additional Church HVAC (to name a few) – that the Parish will need to consider, but that are not currently deemed feasible with limited anticipated funds.

Year-to-Date, 2021

The following projects are being supervised by the Capital Campaign Committee but are being funded outside of the Campaign, either by other Parish ministries (e.g., Toni's Kitchen or The Second Time Around Shop) or directly funded by parishioners. As such, expenses for these projects, even if they flow through the Capital Campaign Account, do not affect the Capital Campaign Anticipated Funds Availability.

The Capital Campaign Fund Balance was \$296,466.23 as of June 30, 2021. The official pledge fulfillment period for those donors who opted to pay their pledges over a five-year period ended in April 2021, although some additional income has been received since April. Based upon our current best revenue projections and expense expected to be paid for critical maintenance and repairs, we expect that there will be no uncommitted funds remaining in the Capital Campaign account by the close of 2021.

Apart from the other possible major maintenance and capital improvement projects just mentioned, one of the key projects planned in the campaign was for an elevator that would provide barrier-free direct access to our second floor where our mission-aligned, expense-reimbursing tenants have workspaces, third floor where we have Choir practice, robing and sheet music storage, as well as the Church School. Our third floor is our most underutilized space because it is so difficult to get to. Estimated costs associated with the construction of an elevator are in the \$300,000 - \$400,000 range. We are planning to soon reach out to all members of the St Luke's parish family and other potential funders in the wider community to help us meet this remaining need and decide whether we could fund additional projects, such as those noted above. In all of this we are endeavoring to be good stewards of *all* our spaces within an older and oftentimes challenging physical plant.

The Committee continues to closely monitor the payment of pledges to the Capital Campaign, providing Finance Committee and Vestry with monthly reports on the current balance of Capital Campaign Account, and projections of future cash flow. Some shortfall in pledge fulfillment exists with some write-offs already made. It is clear that all shortfalls in pledge fulfillment will ultimately impact the work that can be completed. The Committee welcomes new pledges to the Capital Campaign and seeks timely fulfillment of existing pledges.

The Finance Committee is responsible for reviewing the parish finances and budgets, which include Toni's Kitchen (TK), Toni's Closet, and the 2nd Time Around Shop. In addition, the Finance Committee prepares the annual budget for presentation to and approval by the Vestry. Committee responsibilities also include oversight of the investment portfolio, ensuring effective internal controls over the financial processes and submission to the Diocese the Internal Audit (performed by the Audit Committee) or Audited Financial Statements (performed by an audit firm). The Treasurer chairs the Finance Committee and coordinates with Toni's Kitchen's Finance Committee. Keith Kawecki served as Assistant Treasurer, in addition to interim Treasurer of Toni's Kitchen. Finance Committee members include Amy Abel, Stuart Christie (as Warden), Wendy Drake-Schneider (as Warden), Harry Mayo, Cathie Mazza, Matthew Price, Juliet Robinson, and LadyLease White. Arline Amaducci is the bookkeeper who prepares all related financial reports for initial review by the Treasurer. The Committee usually meets on the 2nd Thursday of each month.

Accomplishments July 1, 2020 - June 30, 2021:

- Facilitated the completion of three years of internal church audits
- Established audit committee that prepared and submitted internal audit to Diocesan CFO
- Conducted search for outside auditor, which is a requirement for Toni's Kitchen to obtain grant funding
- Outside audit resulted in TK receiving Sustain and Serve grant in the amount of \$663,000
- Instrumental in assisting TK staff with streamlining daily financial management Keith met with staff on a weekly basis
- Established temporary process to accept stock donations
- Identified a manager for TK donations
- Worked with Senior Warden to file application for PPP loan and received \$171,000
- Successfully submitted PPP Loan Forgiveness application in the amount of \$171,000 currently awaiting notification from SBA
- Established an increased line of credit for credit card usage to accommodate the increase in volume at TK
- Replaced laptop for Arline to ensure sufficient security of SLE/TK data
- Upgraded Quickbooks software
