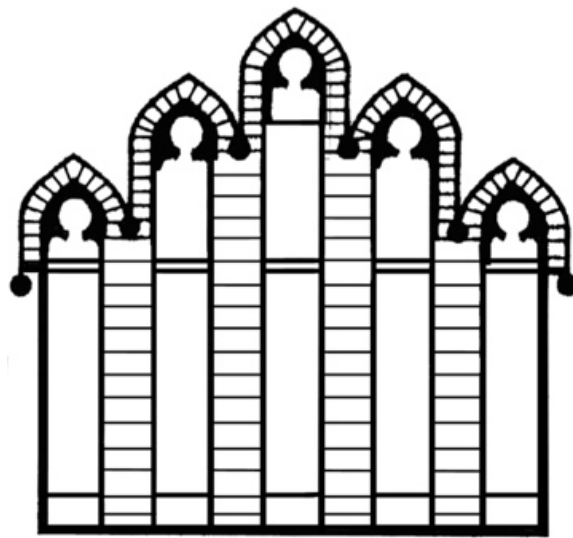

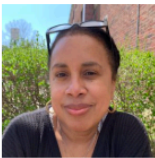

Regulations for Voting at Parish Meeting

2.6 QUALIFICATION OF VOTERS. The persons entitled to vote at any Parish Meeting shall be: [a] Baptized; [b] At least 16 years of age; [c] Of good moral character; [d] Adherents of the Protestant Episcopal Church; [e] in Regular attendance at the services of the Parish for six [6] calendar months before the meeting; [f] Regular contributors to the current expenses of the Parish for the last six months and have made a pledge for the current year. The records maintained by the Treasurer shall be sufficient evidence of contribution. {D. N. Can 9.5}. Contributions may be made individually or as a family unit.

2.10 VOTING. Elections shall be by ballot, and the polls shall remain open for one half hour, and for such longer time as may be required to receive the ballots of the persons present and ready to vote. Proxy and Absentee ballots shall not be allowed. Elections shall be by a plurality of the votes cast.

2025 MEETING MINUTES

Meeting called to order in the Church at 8:42. Quorum confirmed.

John offered an opening prayer, reviewed the agenda, appointed Secretary (Parish Administrator Christine Corso), and explained the by-laws regarding eligibility to vote. Voting was opened; Pam Smith and Lisa Williams will be counting votes.

John introduced the current Vestry and offered a thank-you to Wardens & Vestry on behalf of all of St. Luke's.

The Memorial Committee makes recommendation to the Vestry on the use of funds (half of the income of our Memorial Fund can be designated as a gift to an outreach ministry). Martha Thalheimer is chair.

Approval of minutes of the 2024 Annual Meeting: Lisa Williams first, Sudhir Frederick seconded.

Appreciation for retiring members John expressed heartfelt gratitude: Kayode Oyegbite founded and led DEIB; Okey Okuzu was on the search that brought John to us; Tim Mannion – much love for all he does; Martha Thalheimer is Supreme Executive Worship Commander; Godfrey Gregg was Senior Warden while John was MIA.

Treasurer's Report (*Patrick Rodriguez*): Please see enclosed reports. We are looking at a 7% increase in income and a 3% decrease in expenses. Stretch year; Cox Capital manages two thirds of the fund and is proceeding cautiously. Much thanks to the Finance Committee for their work.

Capital Projects Report (*Keith Kaweckzi*): thanked committee. We lost our pool/ice rink (read: parking lot!). Roof is next – considering solar panels. PAM SMITH ROCKS.

DEIB Committee (*Tim Mannion*): Tim thanked Kayode, the committee, and Stefania Cohen. "Breaking Bread" dinners are ongoing. Rick Fox & Debbie Bloomer will hold an upcoming Adult Forum. Reach out to the committee at dei@slechurch.org.

Toni's Kitchen: Anne Mernin offered highlights of the Toni's 2024 Annual Impact Report (*please see report for details*): Internal reorganization and new staffing, external mobile markets, pop-ups, hyper-local locations where need is focused. Nancy Xenakis is connecting services IN THE SANCTUARY (come see!); Toni's Closet is thriving; analytical tools to make Toni's more effective. Looking ahead: challenges. Sit-down meals are less than 1% of who we serve; we are helping seniors, the working poor. SNAP cuts, Medicaid, Head Start: our guests are FAMILIES. In the first quarter of 2025, our guests/need increased 14% while our food support fell 20% and we lost all of our AmeriCorps interns. We need to secure resources to fulfill this need and need to be *creative* in leveraging support in our community. We have 2,600 volunteers, need to DREAM more broadly: how do we bring our connections to support this work. Anne offered concrete ideas for individuals to help (gardens +), invited everyone to the 4:00pm session being held today, and spoke about Summer Love and the great need in our community. Please share!

D.R.E.A.M. (*see p. 5*) – John talked about the concept: **Deepening Spiritual Practices, Raising Up New Leadership, Encouraging Congregational Growth, Aligning Toni's Kitchen, Multiplying Generous Giving. This is the work!**

Rector's Remarks: John noted that of the 92 parishes in the Diocese serving 6,000 parishioners, St. Luke's is #1 in attendance (even though down 25% since Covid), #1 income, #1 IMPACT. John thanked Kathy DeWalt for raising a generation of youth and Ronald Baltimore, our Director of Music.

John thanked the Nominating Committee: Angela Durham, Susan Ludwigson (chair), Denise Price, and Peter Kim, and Denise presented our new officers: Patrick Rodriguez was elected as Warden, and the Vestry Class of 2028 will be Meaghan Crampton, Shahri Griffin, Nicola Lynch, and Robin Vitullo; Lauren Christie will serve on the Class of 2027, and Jack Newhouse will serve on the Class of 2026. Our Convention deputies will be Kathleen Breiten, Shevon Nelson, and Dina Rodriguez; Brian DiFeo, Rowan DiFeo, and Robin Vitullo will be alternates. Julia Ginocchio was re-elected to Memorial Committee. John commissioned all with prayer.

A motion to adjourn was made by Chelle Carter-Wilson, seconded by Sue Villarosa. Adjourned at 12:20pm.

This year DEIB focused on presenting documentaries relevant to issues facing marginalized groups in America, in past history and present. Each event included a facilitated discussion, a guest speaker, or, in one case, a tour!

Here is a list of highlights from May 2025 to present:

August 2025: Presentation of an episode from the PBS documentary *Living Undocumented*. The documentary graphically exposes harrowing experiences of undocumented families faced with deportation and threats of deportation from the U.S. A lively facilitated discussion led by Angela Durham followed the film.

November 2025: Presentation of “A Place to Become through the Eyes of the Glenridge Avenue YWCA Women 1920-1965” led by Nesta Stephens at the Montclair History Center. Knowledgeable guides from the Center provided spirited and informative tours of the house and grounds. The DEIB committee is excited about planning future activities in partnership with the Center.

May 2026: Presentation of an episode from the PBS series *Asian Americans*. Thanks to Susan Andersen, we were honored to have a terrific guest speaker, Roslyne Shiao, a Co-Executive Director of AAPI New Jersey. Roslyne talked about the history of Asian American Pacific Islander folks in this country and about New Jersey legislation requiring public schools to include history, contributions and perspectives of diverse groups in their curricula.

At present the Committee is planning additional activities in May, including participation in the Lantern Festival on May 30 at Edgemont Memorial Park in Montclair.

LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

Nimble. Creative. Collaborative. This is how we need to be as nearly \$1 trillion in federal cuts to Medicaid and SNAP take effect.

Our vulnerable neighbors will be most impacted—the retired friend living on a fixed income, the school bus driver who safely carries our children each morning, the daycare employee supporting aging parents. These valued neighbors in our suburbs are the heart of our work. Last year, we provided **more than 2 million meals** to those who count on us, and we are more committed than ever to ensuring that nutritious food remains reliably available to all who need it.

As Medicaid cuts roll out our neighbors will lose the healthcare support they need to manage chronic illness. In 2025, we anticipated this coming strain and launched a **Nutrition Action Program**, pairing healthy food with practical education for guests living with diet-related conditions such as diabetes, obesity, and hypertension. Guests with out-of-range screenings work one-on-one with nutrition educators and receive ongoing check-ins from healthcare partners to track their progress. In addition, knowing seniors will be disproportionately affected by what lies ahead, we **expanded our reach to older adults**, increasing our presence at senior centers in Bloomfield and West Orange and extending service to three additional senior living buildings.

We also strengthened our emergency readiness. During the government shutdown, we organized town-wide food drives, established three emergency mobile markets to serve furloughed workers and families affected by suspended SNAP benefits, and distributed 1,900 weekend grocery bags to ensure children had food during a scheduled four-day school closure. This experience reminded us of what this community is capable of when neighbors show up for one another, and fortifies us for what we know we will face.

Together in 2026, we will continue to **identify unmet pockets of food need** to reach more neighbors. **We will expand our Nutrition Action Program** into the broader community and launch a “**Food Pharmacy**,” a clinic-based program providing patients with fresh produce and healthy staples paired with nutrition education to manage chronic illness. We are introducing **Kids at the Kitchen** to steward the next generation of changemakers, helping young people understand food insecurity and discover how they can make a tangible difference in our community. And we are designing new ways for you to partner with us to keep our most vulnerable neighbors healthy and strong.

We carry all of this forward with care and intention, charting a course to use the limited resources of our small organization to the greatest benefit for the neighbors who count on us. In uncertain times, we remain ready to pivot and respond quickly because of you—our volunteers, donors, partners, and friends—who continually give your time, food, clothing, and financial support. That question “**How can I help?**” is the foundation that sustains our work, and the answer is: **let’s link arms and do this together.** We are deeply grateful for this steadfast community, and we are hopeful because of it.

Choice Pantry

Dining Room Service
hot meals served restaurant-style for those who are unhoused or have limited housing.

These programs also provide an opportunity to connect with important wraparound services and free clothing distributions.



STRONGER TOGETHER: PREPARING FOR WHAT'S AHEAD

Enhancing the Programs Our Community Counts On

We provided **842,259 meals** on-site through our **Dining Room** and **Choice Pantry** last year, building good health and stability for our neighbors. As federal nutrition programs are reduced, our reliable presence as a source of fresh meals, produce, and groceries will be more important than ever, creating food security and peace of mind for our community.



Over **61 percent** of our work took place off-site last year, through **nine Neighborhood Mobile Markets**, **47 partner meal sites** and **grocery distribution sites**, our **food truck**, and **home deliveries**, meeting neighbors where they are and creating flexible food solutions for their diverse needs. As federal cuts reduce access to food assistance, embedding these services within the community ensures we reach the people who will need us most.



By building out our **Summer Love** program, we ensured local children have the healthy food they need to thrive when they are without subsidized school meals. Thanks to the generous support of our community, children received over **6,700 fresh meals and healthy snacks**, delivered straight from our kitchen to camps and summer activities. As nutrition funding is cut, programs like Summer Love will ensure children continue to have reliable access to nutritious food and know their community is there for them.

CLOTHING DISTRIBUTIONS

Our **expanded clothing distributions** provided season-appropriate clothing to guests after dining room meal service and at our Choice Pantry. This work is fueled by generous donations from our neighbors and the dedicated volunteers who sort each item. Additional clothing is offered for sale at deeply discounted prices through **Toni's Closet**, giving guests the agency to shop for what they want while raising vital funds for our food work. In 2026, we will bring these distributions into the community through our Neighborhood Mobile Markets.



STRENGTHENING OUR CAPACITY TO SERVE

A new van enhanced the capacity of our distribution network, thanks to a generous grant from the **KearnyBank Foundation**. Our vehicles are the backbone of our work, delivering groceries to seniors and individuals with disabilities, collecting surplus food from more than 20 local businesses, and operating Neighborhood Mobile Markets that bring fresh produce and pantry staples directly to families. As food insecurity rises and government-funded food supplies decline, this expansion ensures we can meet growing need.

We **strengthened our Neighborhood Mobile Markets** thanks to a vital investment from the **State of New Jersey**, bringing fresh produce and groceries to local schools and gathering spaces throughout our community. As federal support recedes, investments like this from the state are all the more meaningful.

RELATIONSHIPS THAT FORTIFY US

The Cookie Project is a new collaboration with Java Love dreamed up by our dear friend, **Cary Chevat**, and led by one of our dedicated volunteers, **Stacey Gold**. Homemade cookies are baked in our kitchen and sold at three local Java Love locations, with sales generating income that directly supports our food programs. In an increasingly uncertain funding climate, The Cookie Project represents exactly the kind of creative, community-rooted revenue we are building to sustain our work.



In anticipation of federal cuts announced in 2025, we **expanded our work with low-income older adults** this winter, ensuring this vulnerable population stays connected to healthy food before instability takes hold. This growth was made possible by the generous support of our community on **Giving Tuesday** and a meaningful grant from the **Grotta Fund for Older Adults at the Jewish Community Foundation of Greater MetroWest NJ**. Through new partnerships with senior housing providers, healthcare organizations, and community groups, we are deepening our capacity to meet older adults' unique needs.



We **deepened our coalition work**, knowing that shared knowledge, pooled resources, and collective action will be essential as federal funds become constrained. Toni's Kitchen worked alongside the **Food & Health Equity Coalition of Essex County**, the **New Jersey Community Kitchens Coalition**, and the **Montclair Unhoused Workgroup**, sharing data, innovations, and strategies to ensure every available resource is fully leveraged on behalf of the people we serve. These relationships are critical as we move forward. No single organization can meet this moment alone.



When the **federal government shutdown** created sudden, acute food insecurity across our community, Toni's Kitchen mobilized rapidly, **launching town-wide food drives**, establishing **three emergency mobile markets** for furloughed workers and families, and distributing **1,900 weekend grocery bags** to children without school meals or SNAP benefits. Our ability to respond at this scale reflects the enduring commitment of our community, and a **generous challenge grant** from the **Silver Family Foundation** and **The Bravitas Group** inspired an extraordinary wave of giving. We learned that we are stronger when we work together, and we now have a toolkit for responding swiftly and comprehensively to future challenges.



TONI'S RESOURCE HUB:

Where Food Opens Doors

Neighbors needing food support often require additional resources for their overall well-being, which is why we partner with **25 local service providers** who offer holistic care at our Choice Pantry, including: mental health counseling, housing support, mammography and cervical screenings, employment coaching, optometry exams and prescription eyewear, and more.

SPOTLIGHT:

The Nutrition Action Program

When we learned guests would lose NJ Family Care (Medicaid) due to federal cuts, we explored how to build their agency over their health and designed a program to leverage knowledgeable volunteers under professional guidance to provide people with education and counseling. Toni's Kitchen launched the **Nutrition Action Program (NAP)** in October, after a summer pilot, to help low-income guests manage nutrition-related chronic conditions including diabetes, hypertension, and weight management.

In partnership with Summit Health Cares and Mountainside Medical Center, NAP offers health screenings, one-on-one nutrition counseling, and twice-monthly workshops in English and Spanish. Ongoing monthly screenings and weekly counselor check-ins track progress on learning and key health indicators like A1C, BMI, glucose and cholesterol levels, and blood pressure. NAP is an example of the creative, low-cost programming we design to remove core obstacles to guests' health: to date, **92 guests have received health screenings** and **97 have attended Saturday Nutrition Workshops**.



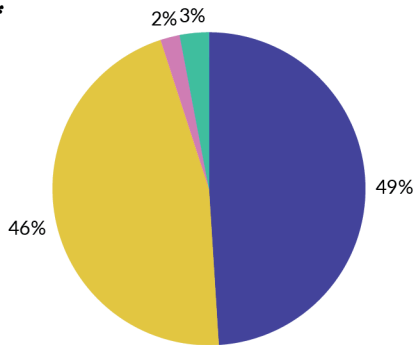

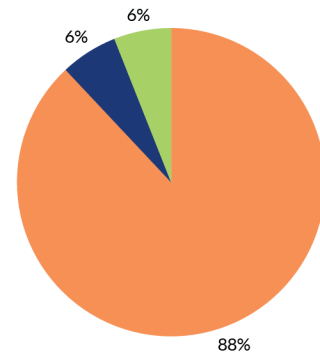

Even as we launched our Nutrition Action Program, expanded outreach to older adults, and provided emergency food support for children and families, we invested in the programs and essentials to carry us forward.

LOOKING AHEAD:

Forging our path with you

In 2026, we will deepen our commitment to the neighbors who count on us. We will bolster programs that build our guests' agency over their own health, placing fresh produce and nutrition education directly in the hands of patients managing chronic illness; expand our food supply; and grow community awareness through programs like Kids at the Kitchen, which guides students in grades 3–8 through hands-on exploration of food insecurity. Through our coalition partners, we will share findings and data to ensure every available resource reaches the neighbors we serve, and we will build out our volunteer networks so that neighbors can play a direct role in supporting the most vulnerable among us.



None of this would be possible without you. Our community fuels a volunteer-driven model and donates food, time, and resources that stretch every dollar further, allowing our small organization to deliver the kind of impact that would otherwise be impossible. That dedication carried us through 2025 and proved something we will carry into the challenges ahead: when this community comes together, we rise to meet the moment.

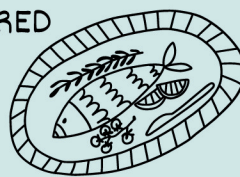

SUPPORT: FAMILY MINISTRIES

Church School remains the most impactful programming of our ministry to the young people of the congregation. One sign of a healthy congregation is that 15% of the worshiping congregation is children from birth to 5th grade, and an additional 10% is youth from 6th to 12th grade. This year, we are once again seeing our children's attendance back at that level. We are continuing to regrow our youth population, and our current 6-8% attendance should continue to rise as our children graduate upward.

The Celebrate! Service has welcomed additional new families. We have gone from an attendance of 10-15 to greeting over 30 people on Sunday mornings. The **Nursery** (held during the 10:00 am service) now regularly hosts 3-5 children. We are currently in need of a new nursery caregiver as Rikki Francoise has moved after ten-plus years of serving our children. If you know of someone over 18 who would like to work a couple of hours a week with our youngest members, please reach out to Kathy or Pam.

We continue to reach out to the community by inviting others to join us at **Breakfast with Santa** and the **Easter Bunny BBQ**. This year, we had 130 people at the Easter Bunny BBQ.

Our most far-reaching outreach takes place at the **Pumpkin Patch**. This year we hosted six different school groups and had game activities on the weekends. Thank you to everyone who volunteered time in the patch to make this experience available to the community. We sold over \$21,477 worth of pumpkins with a profit of \$7,517, and the largest benefit was in the connection with our community.

EYMP (Ecumenical Youth Ministry Project) is thriving this year! We now rotate through the various congregations each month exploring new spaces and building community. Youth have had monthly opportunities to serve at Toni's Kitchen and weekly youth group meetings. This summer, there is the opportunity to participate in Congregational Camp at Cross Roads as well as the Leadership Day Camp here at St. Luke's. Five St. Luke's youth will be accompanying John on the Diocesan youth trip to Taizé this summer.

This summer, we will once again have our **Sunday Morning Old Testament Lego Festival**. Each Sunday, we will work together to recreate the week's story.

Cross Roads Camp continues to be an active ministry partner. We have sent our youth to both Elementary school and Youth Retreats and partnered with the Diocese for Confirmation Retreat.

Crossroads Day Camp will be at St. Luke's August 3-7. This action-packed week includes crafts, songs, worship, and so much more. Last year, we had nine children and six youth who participated in our leadership component. Registration has already begun for this summer, and you will find forms on the bulletin board and website.

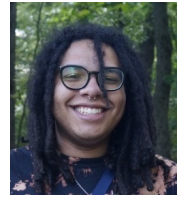

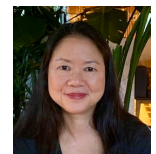

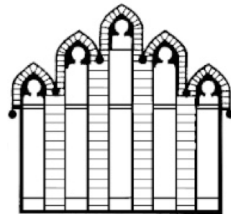
